ADVISORY COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON REPORT

It is with great pleasure that I introduce the Riverina Regional Library (RRL) Annual Report for the 2023-2024 year.

The past twelve months have provided an opportunity to demonstrate once again that the RRL organisation has continued to thrive beyond expectations both operationally and financially. The success of this collaboration in the delivery of library services to our region is an honourable achievement for all concerned.

Following almost two years of legal proceedings, the dispute regarding distribution of RRL assets, following the withdrawal of Wagga Wagga City Council (WWCC) from the service in June 2022, was finally resolved by negotiation between the parties in January 2024. WWCC and RRL member councils are pleased with the fair and equitable outcome and, more importantly, that the organisation can now move forward and continue to provide valuable library services to our libraries.

RRL has continued to focus on maintaining its reputation as a leader in library service provision by contributing to NSW library networks and forums, and further connecting our communities as administrators for shared resource syndicates.

Since it was established in 1978, RRL has grown to become widely recognised throughout Australian library institutions and has welcomed many new councils at various times throughout its history. It is with tremendous excitement that we have welcomed Berrigan Shire Council into the network from 1 July 2024 – increasing the numbers to 11 member councils, 22 branch libraries and 18 mobile library service points.

The absolute dedication and determination of staff at the RRL Administration Centre, branch library staff, and my fellow Advisory Committee members is gratefully acknowledged. Their commitment and continued support to this remarkable organisation is sincerely appreciated.



I am very pleased to commend the RRL Annual Report to you as a great showcase of what the RRL Administration Centre staff and member libraries have delivered over the year. This report highlights the importance of libraries as community hubs for the diverse populations in our region.

MANAGER REPORT



In terms of organisational sustainability, Riverina Regional Library (RRL) has continued its focus on maintaining a flexible and scalable organisation that has facilitated the expansion of the enterprise over many years. This has demonstrated that the success of local government collaboration for effective service delivery is clearly achievable when an agreed philosophical and financially sustainable operating model is developed and implemented.

The transformation in the organisation's technological capacity during the past several years has been remarkable. This increase highlights the ongoing need for skills and capabilities in our workforce to ensure that optimal digital engagement is achieved across the RRL network.

Like all large organisations, RRL faces broad challenges in ensuring its digital presence and operating environment is as secure as possible. Cybercrime reports have increased by 13% each year since 2020 with 10% of the 76,000 reported security incidents in 2022 occurring in the State/Territory/Local Government sector. RRL has invested heavily in security over the last year with major changes implemented including multi-factor authentication; improved firewall and network restrictions; improved spam/phishing policies and utilisation of cloud driven threat detection.

RRL is also committed to improving the efficiency of operations with recent software releases that have enabled staff new avenues for workflow improvement. Utilising the Microsoft Power Apps platform, an application for internal use, has been developed for the Mobile Library. This allows the driver (or RRL staff) to single-click turn-by-turn navigation to a Mobile Library service point via Google Maps, including routing to avoid dirt roads. The app can also activate a simple off-the-road process to send notifications to members and extend any outstanding loans at affected service points.

Automating and reducing the weight of time-intensive tasks is a vital aspect of improving RRL service provision. Many staff workflows involve regular interaction with different systems. RRL will continue to invest in the Microsoft Power Apps platform to provide a single interface environment for many of these workflows, reducing task complexity by having the application do the interaction.

The RRL Book Club continues to thrive by servicing 47 registered clubs across the region this year. A review of the materials included in the kits and weeding of unpopular or old titles over the last year has garnered high praise from book club participants. Twenty-one new kits were purchased this year and are already experiencing high circulation. Weeded kits that were in good condition were given a second life, being donated to other library services or to branch libraries as individual items.

RRL staff also developed ways to provide low-cost kits for basic programs with a reduced staff time investment, and a more frequent review of kits to ensure quality and fresh resources are available to branches. School holiday programs and special interest weeks, such as Senior's Week or Book Week, received good media coverage thereby increasing awareness of these events in the libraries.

Raising awareness of the large range of services available in public libraries has been an unchanging hurdle for libraries in increasing membership. Utilising a combination of traditional and new format media outlets for promotion, RRL increased media engagement this year by building relationships and establishing the library as a source of consistent and high-quality stories. RRL or its branch libraries featured in 65 stories or articles by media outlets between January and August 2023. These features have been in radio, newspaper, and online article format. Additionally, RRL staff produced social media images, content and posters for branch libraries to assist in the promotion of events.

For many years the RRL Annual Branch Meeting has been held at least once per year at the RRL Administration Centre as a valuable and highly anticipated opportunity for branch library staff to participate in workshops, receive updates on RRL activities, and to share ideas and information with other branch library staff from across the network. In June 2023, the meeting departed from its usual format when it was decided to board a coach and take the meeting 'on the road'. The objective was to provide branch library staff with a first-hand look at some of the branches in our region who have applied innovative ideas in their library spaces. The event was so successful that branch library staff requested the same format for 2024.

RRL staff joined several branch library staff from across the RRL network to attend the NSWPLA Annual Conference and AGM in Penrith during November 2023. A major highlight for RRL was the inclusion of our Marketing & Engagement Officer, Katrina Roe, as a presenter on Day 2 of the program. Katrina's presentation titled: Same – Making a Disability Normal was so well received that she has been invited to participate again, this time as a facilitator, at the 2024 conference in Coffs Harbour.

There were changes at the NSW State Library this year as Dr John Vallance retired as State Librarian on 14 November 2023 following a six-year tenure that included an historic increase in Government support for public libraries. His successor, Dr Caroline Butler-Bowden, was announced on 7 November 2023. Dr Butler-Bowden brings with her over 20 years of leadership experience in large public institutions including as curator in state cultural institutions for over a decade.

There is so much more to look forward to in the new financial year – all starting on 1 July 2024, including the discontinuation of reservation fees; a new Mobile Library schedule that includes four new service points in Bland Shire, and the admission of Berrigan Shire Council to the network.

The RRL Administration Centre looks forward to working closely with its member Councils and branch libraries during 2024-25 to provide an inspiring range of library services for the constituents across our region.







MICHAEL ELLIS - VALE



Michael was our Mobile Library Supervisor and a dedicated member of the Riverina Regional Library team for almost 8 years. Over this time, Michael's passion for the role never abated and he took great pride in the service.

He was dedicated to the people in the communities he visited, knowing how important the service was, especially in remote and rural areas. He offered an individualised service to all his library customers who always spoke highly of him. His significant contribution to the provision of library services around the region will be long remembered.





The Mobile Library collection was maintained regularly throughout the year with nearly 1,200 new items added, replenishing almost 22% of the collection, and the deletion of over 650 old items that have not been borrowed for more than 12-18 months.

After a lengthy recruitment process over several months starting in March this year, RRL welcomed Charles Luyt to the position in May. Charles had a quick introduction to the organisation and the Mobile Library before taking to the road without issue, getting to know members and coming up with great ideas for service improvements.

RRL's vision has been to broaden the offerings of the Mobile Library in the smaller townships that it visits by providing programs and events.

In January, the Mobile Library collaborated with NBN Co, hosting a free workshop on scams where members in Lockhart service point learnt about how to protect themselves from cyber criminals. This workshop was well received, and it is hoped that further workshops will be rolled out to other Mobile Library locations in the near future. RRL is seeking to partner with branch libraries and local organisations who have expressed interest in holding programs such as storytime sessions and school holiday events at Mobile Library stops. This is an exciting frontier for the branch on wheels!

MEDIA & MARKETING

Riverina Regional Library (RRL) has increased media engagement over the past year by building relationships to establish the library as a source of consistent, high-quality stories. RRL, or its branch libraries, have featured in an increasing array of stories and articles by media outlets including radio, newspaper, and online article format to raise awareness of the large range of services available throughout the region.

RRL branch library staff have noted that following promotion through media outlets, registrations and attendance at events have increased substantially leading to new members joining.

To further increase visibility, an RRL book review is posted weekly on social media with an accompanying image of representative branch library and RRL staff. These posts regularly perform well above the average as library members like to see their local branch staff member and often engage - increasing the post's reach.



The production of shared promotional materials reduces duplication of effort amongst the branch libraries and enables a consistent theme for an event's promotion. To this end, RRL staff have produced social media images and posters for branch libraries to assist in the promotion of events. These created images can be shared by the branch library on their social media channels, and posters are printed and displayed in the branch. This work is typically undertaken for events that are being held at more than one location, allowing reuse of materials with only minor details requiring amendment.



The RRL Marketing & Engagement Officer is also a regular guest on several local radio stations where library resources and events are freely promoted. Armed with previous radio hosting experience and a great deal of expertise, stories are solidly pitched to a region-wide audience.

The strategies applied to date are just initial steps with goals to include the introduction of a region-wide email newsletter for direct marketing, and the development of partnerships with local organisations.



Riverina Regional Library (RRL) has been in the planning and development phase for much of the year on several major changes that will come to fruition in the new financial year.

Mobile Library Improvements



A comprehensive review of the mobile library timetable was instigated when notification of withdrawal from the mobile library service was confirmed with Greater Hume Council in 2022. This presented an opportunity for other Councils to take up the service or increase their service offering. Bland Shire Council requested the service for four service points in their shire (Barmedman, Tallimba, Ungarie, and Weethalle).

The review also presented the opportunity to make several improvements to the schedule, such as removal of overnight trips, revision of travel times and inclusion of rest stops for longer journeys, and minor restructuring of service days and hours to create more efficient routing. The new and improved timetable starts on 1 July 2024.

A New Member Council Joining



Berrigan Shire Council contacted RRL in late November 2023 to enquire about the possibility of joining the membership. A proposal and estimate of costs were prepared and in February 2024 a workshop was held with Berrigan Shire Councillors who agreed to the transfer of their library services to RRL.

A transition plan was developed by RRL management followed by several meetings held with RRL staff and Berrigan Shire Council/Library staff regarding all aspects of transition to centralised library services.

Berrigan Shire Council has a population of approximately 8,650 and four branch libraries at Berrigan, Barooga, Finley and Tocumwal. To accommodate the inclusion of Berrigan Library to the RRL Internal Delivery Service schedule, an extra day was added to the itinerary - extending the service from 3 days to 4 days per week.

Over the last several months, RRL staff have been assisting Berrigan Shire Library staff with the transition process and providing all necessary training. RRL staff also visited each of the Berrigan Shire libraries to advise on RRL policy, workflows, and collection maintenance.

No More Reservation Fees



Reservation fees were first introduced at RRL sometime during the 1980s at the rate of 20 cents per item. Today, the charge is \$1.00 per item. It is not uncommon, especially for regional library services, to apply a reservation fee for items reserved within their networks. The charge is not a cost recovery exercise to cover the expenses of moving items around the branches, but rather a nominal fee to ensure that customers pick up items held on reserve. Predictably, it is the newest and most popular items in the collection that are reserved most regularly.

During the COVID-19 lockdowns, many libraries temporarily removed reservation fees as well as overdue fines to ensure their members could continue to borrow items unhindered. While some libraries have since reinstated reservation fees, most have permanently discontinued overdue fines - as did RRL from 1 July 2020.

Looking into the future of library service provision for our region, RRL has taken into consideration the trend of collections moving towards more digital offerings – a space where no reservation fees are applied. The physical and digital collections differ in their requirements for storage and transit, however, they are similar in their reservation demands.

RRL staff undertook consultation with RRL branch library staff during June/July 2023 and the feedback was unanimously in favour to discontinue reservation fees in the belief that the move would create better circulation, increased loans, and more visits to the library. Reservation fees will be discontinued from 1 July 2024 whereupon all outstanding fees will be waived.

Adult Programs

This year the Adelong Library has been focused on providing programs for the adults in the community. Additionally, the Library Craft Group meet each month where craft lovers take part in art and craft activities supplied by the library. Both programs have been regularly attended, with lots of opportunities for social interaction, friendly debates, and most of all fun!

Storytime

The library has continued to have Storytime twice a month to encourage a lifelong love of reading for the little ones in our community. These have been well-attended by families in the area, together with regular visits from both primary schools and the local preschool. During these visits the children enjoy themed stories and crafts before browsing the picture book collection and playing with the toys and games in the library. Additionally, we held a Mental Health Storytime in October, where a special guest from Murrumbidgee Health visited to read picture books addressing mental health to the children.

Author Talk

The library was fortunate enough to have author, Joileen Mischel, give a talk about her biography *Broken Past Heals Dreams*. In this book she shares her story of growing up with abuse and how, through resilience, she was able to go on to achieve her dreams. This story, while involving very difficult themes, was inspirational and motivating to hear. The author talk had good attendance by the Adelong community, and we want to thank Joileen for sharing her story with us.

An Essential Community Hub

The Batlow Library and Rural Transaction Centre has had a very busy year this year with 9577 visits, 4459 issues, 196 programs and program attendance of 1209. We have provided seasonal worker and tourist assistance, Department of Human Services Access space and help, and many Council services provided to residents. Many community groups have made use of the library's meeting spaces including Before/After School Care groups, Schools and the Early Child Leaning Centre, Multi-Purpose Service Facility and the Batlow/Adelong Local Health Advisory Committee. The centre provides a safe after-school space for children facilitating digital devices and referencing services for senior students.

Escape Room Challenges

One of the many programs offered this year has been our Escape Room Challenges which have been very well attended. Individuals and family or friendship groups were challenged to find clues to solve scenarios and thereby build up answers to finally provide the solution to the challenge and to collect their reward. It was great to see the varied cross-age groups and the fun everyone had participating in the challenge.

Batlow Beanie Knitters

Our knitting group - Batlow Beanie Knitters - have been in full swing creating wonderful beanies for chemotherapy patients which have been distributed far and wide to various health facilities who provide treatment and care for these patients. In addition, the group created hundreds of beanies for the Batlow Ciderfest in various apple colours and motifs. These were a great hit during the festival and completely sold out.

The traditional knitting of squares for the creation of warm winter blankets also continued and these were for distribution to charitable groups to distribute to people over the colder months.

The group has enjoyed great camaraderie as well as producing these amazing and much appreciated items.

Book with a Twist

To highlight Library and Information Week in early August, Bland Shire Library created a Book with a Twist photo competition funded from a National Backyard Cricket grant. The library received many entries across three age divisions, each being judged on their originality and creativity. Winners and placegetters in each division received prizes and all entries were exhibited in the library. Based on its success, the library plans to make the photo competition a bi-annual event.

Author Visits

The library hosted various authors throughout the year including sociologist and freelance writer, Dr Anne Ring, who delivered an enlightening talk, offering insights into the significance of ageing in our society. The event was held to highlight Seniors Week 2024.

The library was thrilled to host a visit from Dub Leffler, an illustrator, writer, animator, and mixed media artist involved in various artistic endeavours such as books, film, television, muralism, and art education. Dub embarked on a five-day tour of the Bland Shire in early March visiting nine schools, conducting 20 sessions, and engaging with some 700 students from Kinder to Year 10. Dub was warm and engaging, captivating his audiences with his detailed illustrations, realistic portraits and emotional landscapes, plus fun drawing exercises. Dub spoke about his Aboriginal heritage, the creative process and gave students a sneak peak of his next book.

Community Engagement



Drug & Alcohol Information Display

The Coolamon Library hosted the Drug and Alcohol Information stand in April and it was a great way to promote the drug information service to our community. The kit came with a variety of resources for activities and events, so we partnered with our local Community Drug Action Team committee and held an event for our local high school. The Coolamon Central School brought classes from Year 9 to Year 12 with approximately 120 students attending. We held a variety of activities including making mocktails, playing drug bingo, a beer goggle game, and a 'standard drink' educational pouring game. Prizes were awarded for the best mocktail and 'the know your standard drink' competition. Pamphlets and flyers were given out to students on the day, and we received great feedback from the school.

Local Government Week

The Coolamon Shire Council each year celebrates Local Government Week. It is an opportunity for our Council to highlight the work we do and the services and facilities it provides to our community. The library held two events during this week. *Storytime on the Road* provided Storytime sessions to the communities that were unable to attend our regular Storytime sessions in Coolamon. We travelled to Ardlethan and Ganmain Preschool for a reading and craft session for the pre-schoolers to enjoy. *Storytime with the Mayor* was held at the Library with our Mayor, David McCann, our special guest. Several schools and preschools attended this session.

Christmas Craft at Allawah Lodge

The library in conjunction with Allawah Lodge (our local residential aged care facility) provided a Christmas craft session for the residents. Renovations

A small temporary library operated during the renovation, allowing people access to computers, printing, and to borrow and return books.

Four paintings by local artist, Lyn Angus, were purchased. These depict the beautiful aspects and vibrant colours of the Cootamundra landscape. Now retired, Lyn was a casual employee at our library for many years.

The 'On the Road Again' RRL Annual Branch Meeting visited our beautiful new space where local guest speaker, Ellanah Bickerdike, talked about living and raising a young family in Fiji where she is passionate about her volunteer work.

Community Education

The library secured funding from the NSW State Library to run the Tech Savvy Seniors program designed to increase digital literacy in the older population. Sessions run by Kerry Byrne during February and June covered emails, online banking, shopping, and using the internet. Attendees preferred the one-on-one lessons, rather than small group sessions that were historically provided.

NBN Community Ambassador, Michael Palmer presented the Stay Safe online workshop in March for eighteen attendees. This was Michael's second visit to our library, and we look forward to him returning in the future.

Dr Anne Ring discussed her book *Engaging with Ageing* as part Senior's Week. Lunch was included and a \$50 voucher at a local business as a lucky door prize.

Law Week

The library welcomed solicitor Halil Ozbeyazli from the Seniors Rights Service in Sydney during Law Week to present a community seminar on *Aged Care and Nursing Homes: Your Legal Rights*. Halil provided insights to help residents and their families access justice with their rights to care, freedom of choice, financial protection, and freedom from abuse and neglect. We appreciate the Seniors Rights Service for their ongoing support of older people and their families in our local government area.






